Juneau

As Alaska’s remote state capital, Juneau is unique because it is completely inaccessible by road—you can only arrive by sea or air. This port is a hub for outdoor adventure and breathtaking scenery. The crown jewel of the area is the easily accessible Mendenhall Glacier, where you can hike to Nugget Falls or kayak in the icy lake. Juneau is also renowned as one of the best places in Alaska for whale watching, with a nearly guaranteed chance to spot humpback whales feeding in the nutrient-rich waters. If you prefer to stay close to port, take the Mount Roberts Tramway for sweeping views of the Gastineau Channel, or grab a bite at the famous Tracy's King Crab Shack.

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Skagway

Stepping into Skagway is like stepping back in time to the 1898 Klondike Gold Rush. This well-preserved historic town is framed by dramatic, snow-capped peaks and features wooden boardwalks lined with gold

rush-era facades. The absolute must-do experience here is the White Pass & Yukon Route Railway, an engineering marvel that takes you on a scenic, narrow-gauge train ride up treacherous mountain passes and into the Canadian Yukon. For active travelers, Skagway offers excellent hiking trails right from downtown, including the trek to Lower Dewey Lake. Be sure to grab a locally brewed beer or visit the legendary Red Dog Saloon before heading back to the ship.

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Ketchikan

Known as the "Salmon Capital of the World," Ketchikan is the southernmost city in Alaska and often the first stop on an Inside Passage cruise. Built right over the water and backed by forested slopes, this vibrant town is famous for historic Creek Street—a picturesque boardwalk perched on pilings over a salmon creek. Ketchikan is also the premier destination for experiencing Alaska Native culture; it boasts the world's largest collection of standing totem poles at places like Totem Bight State Historical Park and the Saxman Native Village. For a true wilderness experience, consider taking a floatplane tour to the breathtaking Misty Fjords National Monument.

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Victoria, British Columbia

Victoria is a mandatory stop for non-U.S. flagged cruise ships sailing to Alaska from Seattle, but it is far more than just a regulatory detour. The capital of British Columbia offers a delightful slice of British charm blended with Pacific Northwest beauty. The Inner Harbour is the bustling heart of the city, framed by the majestic Parliament Buildings and the iconic Fairmont Empress Hotel (where you can stop for traditional afternoon

tea). The undisputed highlight of Victoria is the world-renowned Butchart Gardens, a stunning 55-acre floral wonderland built in a former limestone quarry.

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Sitka

Facing the open Pacific Ocean, Sitka is a stunning, off-the-beaten-path port with a fascinating history. It was once the capital of Russian America, and that heritage is still visible today at the onion-domed St. Michael's Cathedral in the center of town. Sitka is equally rich in Tlingit indigenous culture; the Sitka National Historical Park offers a beautiful coastal trail lined with towering totem poles, marking the site of a historic 1804 battle. Wildlife lovers should not miss the Fortress of the Bear (an orphaned brown bear rescue) or the Alaska Raptor Center, which rehabilitates injured bald eagles.

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Icy Strait Point

Located near the Tlingit village of Hoonah on Chichagof Island, Icy Strait Point is a cruise port purpose-built by the local Alaska Native corporation. It offers a highly authentic, uncrowded, and nature-focused experience. The waters of Icy Strait (specifically Point Adolphus) have one of the highest concentrations of humpback whales in the world, making this a top-tier destination for whale watching. Inland, Chichagof Island boasts one of the densest brown bear populations on earth. If you are seeking a pure adrenaline rush, you can ride the ZipRider—one of the longest and highest ziplines in the world, descending rapidly through the rainforest down to the beach.

Alaska Cruise Port Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)

Should I book my Alaska shore excursions in advance?

Absolutely. Due to Alaska's short tourist season and the high demand for unique experiences, popular excursions often sell out months in advance. It is highly recommended that you book bucket-list activities like helicopter flightseeing, dog sledding, and the White Pass & Yukon Route Railway well before your sail date.

What happens if my independent excursion runs late and I miss the ship?

Reputable tour operators and aggregators (like the Viator options linked in this guide) structure their tour times directly around cruise ship schedules. Many independent tour operators offer a "Return to Ship" guarantee. This means if a tour is delayed through no fault of your own, they will cover the expenses (such as travel and lodging) to get you to your next port of call.

Do I need a passport for an Alaska cruise?

If you are a U.S. citizen sailing on a "closed-loop" cruise (beginning and ending in the same U.S. port, like Seattle), you can technically travel with an original birth certificate and a government-issued photo ID. However, because nearly all Alaska cruises include a mandatory stop in Canada (such as Victoria, B.C.), **bringing a valid passport is highly recommended** in case of an emergency that requires you to fly home from a foreign port.

What should I pack for Alaska shore excursions?

The golden rule for dressing in Alaska is to **pack in layers**. The weather can change rapidly from chilly mornings to sunny afternoons, and rain is always a possibility in the temperate rainforests of the Inside Passage. Be sure to bring a lightweight waterproof jacket, comfortable and water-resistant walking shoes, a warm fleece or sweater, and a great pair of binoculars for spotting distant wildlife.
